

We are in the midst of planning on having a Trunk or Treat in the parking lot near Halloween, plus making up welcome packets for the new residents of Rose Commons Apartments; the new building opening just a block away from the church in October. A new Bible Study led by David Speas begins soon (as shown elsewhere in this newsletter), plus other happenings around the holidays. From the Pastor's Desk

Something my wife, Pastor Amanda shared with her congregation, and I think it bears mentioning here as well, is the notion that it can sometimes be easy for us to get focused on *inviting* people to church, but sometimes we forget about *preparing* for them once they do come. For someone who walks through our doors on a Sunday morning for the first time, their experience can be anything from a breath of fresh air, to something that turns them away from God forever. Now, that is a heavy thought, isn't it? We know from experience different churches can lean in different directions:

- Some are ministry-centered.
- Some are theology-centered.
- Some are casual-centered.
- Some focus on the down and out.
- Some are charismatic-centered.
- Some make grace the main thing.
- Some are shaped by reacting to what they have always been, and not wanting to change.

In all these points, (or others not listed) where do you see Grace? Where do you want to see Grace?

Here's the big question for us: Are we ready for the new believer who walks through our doors?

I came across an article from Saddleback Community Church that gave a list of the "Top 10 Ways to Make Sure I'll Never Revisit Your Church." It included things like not being welcoming in the parking lot, ignoring visitors during the service (or singling them out too much), neglecting children's ministry, talking about money more than the gospel, or the worship service being dated or just plain boring.

In other words, even if a church has strong theology and good programs, if they aren't *preparing* well, they may inadvertently close the door before someone even has the chance to meet Jesus.

The early church gives us a different model. In the New Testament, believers first invited their friends to follow Jesus. Then they gathered together as a church family for encouragement, prayer, worship, and growth. The church wasn't the place where salvation happened, it was the place where salvation was nurtured and strengthened.

That's why our goal at Grace shouldn't be just to *invite* people to church. Our real mission is to invite people to Jesus. Church comes later. Church is where disciples are formed, where believers are sustained, and where the community is built up for mission.

So, let's prepare together. Let's go out in the world in service of others while sharing the Gospel, and create ways of leading people to Jesus outside of Sunday morning. At the same time, let's make Grace not only a place where people are *invited*, but a home where new believers can be welcomed and loved, into the fullness of life in Christ.




